

The Problem




These attachment disorders isolate us from our better nature and God's grace.



Our Goal


The Addiction Recovery Advocates

recovery resources.






Our Solution

Give clergy and laity, who are facing the mounting consequences of inordinate attachments, a tool they can use to act as that conduit.




We offer clergy & laity a sustainable, crowd-sourced, and web-based resource archive solution.

We List Over 200 Resources








Informed by the membership of our clergy by surveying their needs.







